- Make sure the value of the investment at death will not be subject to probate costs, legal fees, court delays, etc.
- Make sure that principal and interest will be available in amounts stated and that the investment is depression-proof.
- Make sure that gains from investment appreciation will not be subject to federal income tax.
- Make sure your investments provide you with a guaranteed income.
