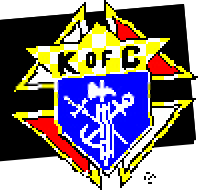

# Chancellor's Challenge

### LABOR DAY



Finally the "Dog Days" of summer are coming to a close. We are trying to cram in the last few barbecues and get the kids ready to go back to school. Isn't it ironic that in the midst of all this we celebrate "Labor Day". Oddly enough Labor

Day had its roots closely connected to the establishment of the Knights of Columbus. Peter McGuire, the son of a poor Irish immigrant, helped to organize the first Labor Day. It was established because workers were being forced to work long hours for low pay. Immigrants worked in factories for ten to twelve hours per day stopping only for a short time to eat. They came to work even if they were tired or sick because if they didn't they might be fired. Thousands of people were waiting to take their place.

Because of the intolerable condition, workers began talking about organizing themselves into a union of laborers to improve their working conditions. In the spring of 1872, Peter McGuire along with 100,000 others in New York City went on strike and marched through the streets demanding a decrease in the long working day.

This strike prompted Peter to work toward the "unionizing" of the country's trades and thus began the formation of today's trade unions. After the idea of organizing the workers had taken hold across the country, Peter and laborers in other cities planned for a holiday for workers on the first Monday in September, halfway between Independence Day and Thanksgiving Day.

On September 5, 1882 the first Labor Day parade was held in New York City. Twenty thousand workers marched up Broadway. They carried banners that read "LABOR CREATES ALL WEATH" and "EIGHT HOURS WORK - EIGHT HOURS FOR REST - EIGHT HOURS FOR RECREATION". In 1894, Congress voted it a federal holiday.

Although the formation of Labor Day occurred over a century ago, what Peter McGuire and the other workers were calling for is still applicable to us today. I would like to focus on their one banner which read "EIGHT HOURS WORK - EIGHT HOURS FOR REST - EIGHT HOURS FOR RECREATION".

Today most of us have no problem fulfilling the

"EIGHT HOURS WORK" part of the message. In fact our work ethic drives us to put in days of ten and twelve hours which were once considered oppressive. Our working conditions are better, our pay is better, but are our lives really better for it? Are we asking too much of ourselves and our families to attain a material wealth in this world?

The second part of their message contains great wisdom "EIGHT HOURS FOR REST - EIGHT HOURS FOR RECREATION". It is well documented that we need time for ourselves and our families. Time to be together. Time to be intimate together. Time to love one another. We also need time to nurture our spiritual lives. Time to get away from the world so we can get a fresh perspective and allow our God to speak to our hearts. We can't do this in a few weeks of vacation a year.

Our bodies also need time for rest. One study I read recently spoke of the lack of rest as a cause for the stomach troubles many of us encounter. Oddly enough the body does a lot of repair on our bodies while we are asleep, especially in our digestive tract.

A good nights sleep prepares us to take on the challenges of the day with vigor.

Has ignoring the wisdom of these immigrant workers caused many of today's societal ills? I'm not sure we can blame it totally on this, but I'm sure it has a far greater effect that many of us realize.

The challenge for September is for us to take note of our forefather's wisdom and look closely at whether we need to re-evaluate our lives and take more time for ourselves and our families. We can easily put a price on our work. How easily can we put a price on the toll our long hours have on our bodies and families?

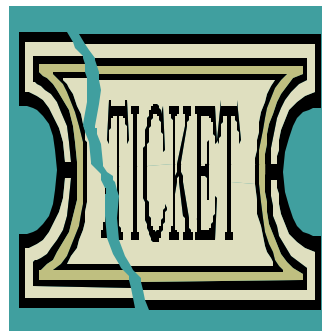

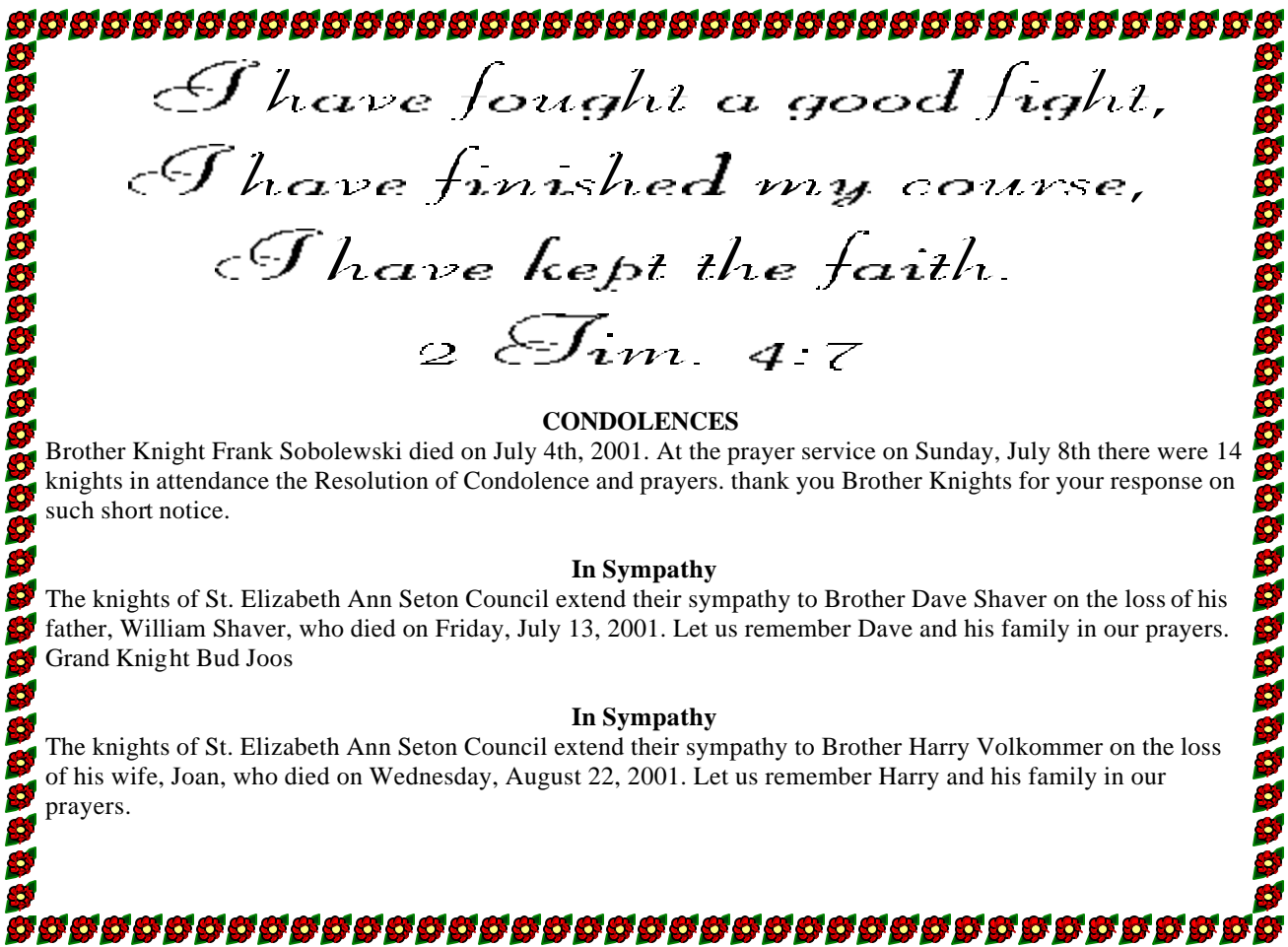
