

## Chancellor's Challenge March –2002

Here we are back in the Lenten times. For me, this time is tougher than making “New Year’s resolutions” because our sacrifice is supposed to cause us to reflect on who we are, our relationship with our God and how our sinfulness keeps us from fully appreciating to gifts of His love.


I remember hearing throughout Catholic school that we were to form a “righteous informed conscience” as we grow in our faith. In the eighties, many people turned sin into the joke that we had been indoctrinated into “Catholic Guilt”. However you wish to view it—conscience or guilt—it is supposed to be a way for us to look deeply into our hearts and see the ways (sin) we separate ourselves from God’s love. Deacon Dave in his RCIA class last year explained this very aptly. He said that all of us have our own “sin” which is always before us. Maybe that sin is greed, lust, gluttony or any of the other seven deadly sins. Perhaps it appears in a much more subtle form such apathy, hatred, bigotry, self service or self righteousness. Whatever the sin, during lent, we are called to look it in the face and try to overcome it through reflection, fast and abstinence.

Unfortunately in today’s world it is politically correct to try and find qualifications for sin. Here are my Top Ten reasons:

1. It’s human nature.
2. Everyone else does it.
3. It’s only a *“little sin”*.
4. I only do it once in a while.
5. I’m not near as bad as everyone else.
6. I do a lot of good things, one transgression won’t hurt.
7. It’s not hurting anyone else.
8. It’s a stupid rule and the Church doesn’t have the right to ask me to do this.
9. It would cause us undue stress and be a burden.
10. It’s my life, my body and my right to choose.

These qualifications cause us to become numb to the effect of sin in our lives. It allows us to suppress our guilt or shame for allowing these sins to control our lives.

Instead of qualifying our sin, during lent (and throughout our lives), we should reflect on our guilt and see how it is really calling us to see that we are turning away from God. Our shame and guilt should empower us to “carry our cross” to God and ask for His forgiveness, even if we have to struggle everyday of our lives to overcome our sin. We need to remember that God is always



ready to forgive us for our transgressions and send us to gift of His Spirit to help us overcome our human frailties.

The theme of the K of C for this year continues to be “Called to Serve”. Let us use this lent to reflect on anything which is separating us from truly loving and honoring our God. For in continuing in our sin we are inhibiting our ability to serve our God and our fellow man effectively and completely.


## Clippers Tickets By. Mark Borys
