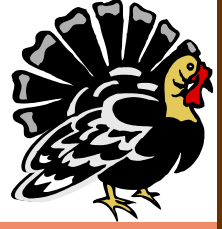

Chancellors' Corner

Brother Knights,

It's hard to believe that the leaves are falling, we've had two freeze warnings recently, and November is upon us. Everywhere the signs of impending winter are clearly evident: daylight savings time has ended; the World Series is over; the Browns and Bengals are officially out of the playoff hunt, and Christmas decorations have taken their place on the retailer's shelves between the left-over Halloween costumes and the Valentine's Day candy. The year has truly flown by, and we are at the starting gate for what I like to call the "Great American Season of Excess". It's time to start planning Thanksgiving Dinners, Christmas parties, and getting in shape for the most grueling test of human physical endurance ever conceived: holiday shopping. Get ready to start stressing out over whether you will once again have to endure Aunt Zelda's Thanksgiving green-bean tofu casserole, and whether you will be able to find that one certain toy that your children want this year. You know, the one that *every child* in our hemisphere wants but no store has had in stock since August? Happy Holidays, indeed.

Don't get me wrong; I love this time of year. I'm as prone as anyone to get caught-up in the frenzy. I'm also guilty, as many are, of losing sight of the "reason for the season." This month and next, I will be advocating that we all step back a bit and consider the underlying religious significance of the coming holiday season, and be sure to make our faith a greater, more active part of our celebrations. Let's start with Thanksgiving Day.

This month, we celebrate the Thanksgiving Holiday with the traditional dinner with family and friends. Our current Thanksgiving Day customs are rooted in the celebration of the Pilgrims in 1621 at the Plymouth, Massachusetts colony, in which they feasted and gave thanks for their survival and their first harvest. Today, we still gather at the table to give thanks. However, after surviving lots of preparation and dysfunctional family moments, when the turkey has been reduced to a bare carcass and the relatives have gone home to sleep off the meal, too often our sense of "thanksgiving" is put away with the good china and left-over mince pie as we get ready for the biggest shopping day of the year. And it really shouldn't be that way. We should try to give thanks every day in some way.

Giving thanks is an integral part of our Catholic faith. The Scriptures are filled with passages urging us to give thanks to God for the gifts he has given us, e.g. "Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good, His mercy endures forever" (Psalm 118:1). For Catholics, the act of thanksgiving is at the heart of all our celebrations and beliefs. Each time we share in the Eucharist we thank God for the gifts He has given us. According to the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, the Eucharist "...is a sacrifice of thanksgiving to the Father..." and "...Eucharist means first of all 'thanksgiving'". The Thanksgiving holiday, then, is a perfect reminder for all of us that we should give thanks for our many blessings throughout the year.

This year, I urge that we all commit to make an effort to try to give thanks daily for the bounty that we have received. And once we have committed to give thanks more often for our many blessings, perhaps we can begin to share those blessings with the less fortunate. Consider showing your gratitude through sharing your plenty with someone who has less. Donate to a food pantry; help out at a local shelter; volunteer to visit the elderly at a nursing home who may not have friends or family with whom to celebrate the holidays.

In closing, my hope is that as we gather around our tables for Thanksgiving dinner this month, we are inspired to remember that truly giving thanks is more than something we do once a year; it's something we should do all year long.

Good - and Bad - News on Respect Life

The good news is that people are more aware of the sanctity of life. Just this week, both the U.S. House and Senate approved a bill banning the horrific practice known as “partial birth abortion”. In this late term procedure a baby is delivered until only its head remains in the mother. Then the abortionist sticks scissors into the base of the skull and suctions out the brain, killing the baby and collapsing the skull. The AMA has consistently said there is NO medical reason for this procedure, but abortion advocates still claim it violates the mothers “right to choose”. The bill banning this was co-authored by our own senator from Ohio, Mike DeWine and supported by George Voinovich. President Bush has promised to sign the bill as soon as he returns to Washington.

Also this week, the President’s brother, Governor Jeb Bush in Florida struck another blow for life. He ordered that the feeding tube of a brain-damaged woman be reinserted so she will remain alive. Removing the tube would cause her to slowly die by starvation.

Meanwhile, the YWCA fired rabid feminist and abortion rights supporter Patricia Ireland as its chief executive, at least partially because right to life groups have opposed her appointment. Lastly, the Supreme Court refused to hear an abortion rights sponsored appeal to overturn the conviction of a drug-addicted mother who killed her stillborn child with crack cocaine.

Abortion rights groups are very worried about this trend toward respecting life. The bad news is they plan on fighting all of the above pro-life victories with court appeals. Keep praying and otherwise supporting the respect life movement - we desperately need to replace the culture of death in this country with a culture of life.

One practical way you can show your support is to come with us to the annual March for Life in Washington, DC, to protest the Supreme Court’s infamous Roe vs. Wade decision that legalized abortion in the United States for any reason throughout all nine months of pregnancy, including babies that are partially born. Since 1974 hundreds of thousands of people have gathered each year in Washington, DC, to protest this murder of millions of innocent children each year.

The **Knights of Columbus** have been active in the March For Life since the beginning. The Supreme Knight and our national organization have consistently and strongly spoken out in opposition to abortion and in support of the Right to Life of all. The Pope has made it quite clear that the Roman Catholic Church condemns abortion and it is a matter of faith that life begins at conception and is sacred until natural death.

Last year over 100,000 people came to Washington DC to participate in the **March For Life**. You didn’t see it on TV or read about it in Time, Newsweek, or the newspapers because our liberal media supports abortion. But our representatives to Congress notice, and the more people that show up, the more they notice. The **Columbus area Knights** sponsored a bus to the march last year, including 6 people from **Seton Parish** – three of which were SPY students that were sponsored by our council and the SPY program. Thanks to our council for your great support!

Again this year, the Columbus area Knights are sending a bus to the March For Life on January 21-22. **It is important that we show our representatives how we feel about abortion and legalized murder of children.** We finally have a president that supports the Right to Life and will sign legislation restricting abortion – last year President Bush sent an encouraging message to the marchers and spoke via phone to the group. **Instead of sending 6 people, Council 11187 should fill an entire bus by itself!!**

This is something very important and very worthwhile, and a lot of fun as well. Lets show our representatives how we really feel!! Lets get fired up and make a HUGE showing at this year’s March For Life!!

When Can Life Be Terminated?

The case of Terri Schiavo has been in the news quite a bit recently. She was brain damaged from unexplained heart failure that deprived her of oxygen for 10 minutes in 1990. Doctors are divided over whether her condition might improve. Her doctor says that medically she is brain dead and Michael, her husband, claims she would not want to be kept alive like this. He got legal permission from the Florida Supreme Court to remove her feeding tube. Terri's parents and family say she can communicate and appears to understand some words. They enlisted the help of the pro-life movement and got the Florida legislature to pass a bill ordering her feeding tube replaced. Governor Jeb Bush signed the bill and the feeding tube was reinserted.

Where does the Catholic Church stand on questions like this? The Pope has made it clear that ALL life is sacred from conception to **natural** death. Notice I emphasized "natural". The Church's position is that extraordinary means do NOT need to be taken to prolong a life - in other words, you do not have to be kept alive by machines if there is no hope of recovery. We ARE required to do all in our power to help someone when they have a chance of recovery. To turn off the machines that are the only thing keeping someone alive and allowing them to die **naturally** is an acceptable alternative.

This case is different, though. It isn't a machine that is keeping Terri alive - it is a feeding tube. Removing the feeding tube would cause her to starve to death because she cannot eat, but it would be a natural death. In a situation like this, is a feeding tube an "extraordinary" measure? This is a real dilemma for pro-life supporters.

Conservative columnist Ben Shapiro had this to say:

"This case is nuanced enough that pro-lifers and pro-pull-the-pluggers should not have split along political lines. But strangely enough, the pro-Terri vs. pro-Michael debate did divide along political lines. In broad terms, those defending Terri's right to life are anti-abortion; those defending Michael's plug-pulling are pro-choice. Those defending Terri's right to life are religious; those defending Michael's plug-pulling are secular. Those defending Terri's right to life are politically conservative; those defending Michael's plug-pulling are politically liberal. Why?

Because America's conservative religious community constantly strives to find reasons for preserving life, in accordance with the biblical text: "Before you I have placed life and death, the blessing and the curse. You must choose life, so that you and your descendants will live" (Deuteronomy 30:19). For the religious, every life is worth living, even if we do not know the purpose of a given life. Terri Schiavo is a life -- therefore, Terri Schiavo is worth saving.

Those who are liberal and secular focus on "quality of life." What kind of life is worth living? Is the mentally disabled child worth keeping or aborting? Should the elderly, in pain, riddled with disease, be allowed euthanasia? Not only are these questions asked, they are all answered in the same way: Those kinds of lives are not worth living. Terri Schiavo's life is of limited quality -- therefore, Terri Schiavo is not worth saving.

It cuts even deeper than a "quality of life" issue for secularists. In many cases, abortion is not a quality-of-life issue. Even if the child will grow up happy and healthy, secularists do not oppose aborting that child. An abortion is an abortion is an abortion. Invariably, the secularists side with death.

A society must be based on love of life, whether that life is perfect or the life of Terri Schiavo. We must choose life in order that we may live. For who among us has a perfect life? Had we all been aborted, or had the plug been pulled, or had a murderer been set free, society would have no meaning -- we would descend to the level of animals. Which might be the goal of the liberal secularists in the first place."

For Brother Knights, by Brother Knights

We all know and appreciate the good work the Knights of Columbus does for the Church and charitable causes. But did you know that our insurance program is an essential part of the Order? Protecting families from economic adversity has been a key part of the Knights of Columbus mission since its founding in 1882.

Our founders passed the hat to support the widows and children of Brother Knights who had died. We've grown into one of the largest individual life insurers in North America - with more than \$38 billion of individual life insurance in force. Moreover, contrary to some misconceptions, our insurance program is not directed in any way by a "separate company" and never has been.
