CHANCELLOR'S CORNER

Brother Knights,

February has arrived, and with it come the traditional themes of love and romance that are associated with the Valentine's Day celebration. Much has been written about the origins of Saint Valentine's Day within the Church; how the Church established February 14 as a feast day honoring two saints who were martyred for their beliefs, as an alternative to the Roman tradition of young men choosing young women by lottery at this time each year to be their companions.

We also are aware of all the trappings and traditions that have evolved in this country regarding the secular, "Hallmark" holiday of Valentine's Day. Candy, cards, hearts and lots of pink and red decorations adorn the stores and shopping centers from just after Christmas through February 14 each year. Youngsters exchange valentine cards in school and in some cases experience their first romantic crushes. Men, generally less romantic than the opposite sex, wander into card shops, malls and florists with no clue how to express their feelings for their ladies, but convinced that the answer lies in spending money at a retail establishment. Women imagine that all sorts of romantic gestures are forthcoming from their men, and feign delight when we show up with yet another Whitman's Sampler in a red, heart-shaped box.

Such is the status of our annual celebration of love in America. But love is a much more complex issue that requires constant contemplation and exercise if it is to truly exist. What, then, is this thing called "love" that plays such a fundamental role in our lives? As Catholics, we are taught at least three kinds of love: for God, for ourselves, and for others. How we express this love is, I think, the most fascinating aspect of our humanity. And one means of expression that encompasses elements of each of the three types of love set out above is the concept of family. I would like to focus on the role of love in the family, and the role of family in the expression of love.

Our Pope, John Paul II, has throughout his ministry been a great champion of family life. In his work entitled *Familiaris Consortio* written in the early 1980's, the Pope describes the role of the family in the Church as follows: "Christian marriage and family build up the Church; for in the family the human person is not only brought into being and progressively introduced by means of education into the human community, but by means of rebirth in baptism and education in faith is also introduced to God's family, which is the Church". Thus, we convey our love of God by nurturing the family unit.

Similarly, the family is the basis for our understanding of the need to love ourselves, and where we establish our identity and self worth. Parents have an irreplaceable role in developing the human and spiritual life of their children. The child who is the product of a loving family environment will develop a strong sense of self-worth and esteem. The Pope addresses parents as the "first evangelizers" of their children. This an important message in our modern times when the demands of two-income families leave some kids feeling alone while their parents are busy with other matters. Clearly, the family is the foundation for learning to love oneself.

Finally, the family is the place where the acceptance of the full dignity of each person begins. "If a sense that all persons are equal in dignity does not begin in the family, it probably will not happen elsewhere" (*Familiaris Consortio*). Within the family, there are two key relationships that affirm the basic equality and dignity between persons. First, there is the love between husband and wife. In his writings, the Pope sees this love as an expression of full self-giving; one may not use the other as an object or a thing for selfish purposes. Second, the relationship between parent and child, in addition to forming a child's self worth, is paramount in forming a child's basis for relationships with his fellow humans outside of the family. The abused child will not learn dignity and love for his fellow man. Therefore, the family is the basis for establishing a sense of love for others.

In conclusion, it is clear that the concept of love embodies more than what is represented by an annual day of exchanging cards and candy. It certainly is not to be found in the emphasis on sex and sexuality portrayed in the media. Rather, it is that sense of love for God, others and ourselves that, as our pontiff so clearly understands, begins first and foremost within our familial relationships. Our challenge, then, is to work hard all year round on our relationships with our children, our spouses, and our friends. Never take for granted that your family and friends know how you feel about them. Rather, no matter how awkward or uncomfortable it may sometimes seem, express your love often for those you care about, in words and deeds. Additionally, we must look within ourselves to understand who we are as individuals, and to do what is necessary to be at peace with who we are. By so doing, we will advance the love of God as He has designed.

MARCH FOR LIFE

31st Anniversary of Roe vs. Wade

January 22, 2004, was the 31th anniversary of the U.S. Supreme Court's infamous decision legalizing abortion. As on every January 22nd since 1973, supporters of Right to Life peacefully and prayerfully gathered in Washington DC to remember this modern holocaust and let our elected officials know we want the law changed to stop this ultimate child abuse. This year approximately 150,000 people gathered to March for Life.

Ten people from Seton went on the Greater Columbus Knights of Columbus bus from Reynoldsburg. My wife Vicki and I went, along with Molly Heuser, Hector Raymond and two SPY students: Brianne Hoover and Jordan Hooker. Our thanks to Council 11187 for sponsoring these students. The students were enthusiastic and motivated and really appreciated the council's support. Council 11187 also sponsored seminarians David Schalk and Ty Tomson - we saw them there with the other seminarians from the Josephinum (they sent two buses of seminarians). David and Ty sat with us for the Vigil for Life Mass.

The events started with a spectacular Vigil for Life Mass at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception. The opening procession of deacons, seminarians, priests, and bishops took 20 minutes! Vicki counted 3 or 4 Cardinals, 39 bishops, and 323 priests - almost 400 total clergy. Cardinal William Keeler, Archbishop of Baltimore and chairman of the U.S. Bishops Council on Pro-Life activities, was the principal celebrant and gave a great homily about the sanctity of life. He also spoke of the need to support women so they don't feel that abortion is their only alternative. During the Mass, a letter from President Bush in support of the pro-life movement was read.

The next morning we went to the Ohio Right to Life Congressional Breakfast. Both of our senators, George Voinovich and Mike DeWine, spoke at the event and reiterated their support for pro-life issues, especially Senator DeWine's recently enacted ban on partial birth abortion. Senator Voinovich spoke quite strongly about the pro life movement and influence of the Holy Spirit in building a culture of life. A number of other Ohio congressional representatives were also there. Mike DeWine invited those at the breakfast to come to his office after the March. Several of us did and got our pictures taken with the Senator. Several other speakers spoke about the progress the pro-life movement has made and the challenges we still have to overcome.

The keynote speaker, Georgette Forney, co-founder of the national Silent No More Campaign, told us about the terrible toll abortion takes on women. Silent No More is an organization for women who have had abortions and want to tell the world what pro choice advocates want to hide - the tremendous regrets and physical aftereffects of abortion. Ms. Forney spoke of the need to support women and take away the reasons for getting an abortion - lack of emotional support and

resources. She said this should be the next direction the pro-life movement should take. After the march, over 50 women from the Silent No More Campaign held their own protest in front of the Supreme Court by silently holding signs saying "I regret my abortion".

After the breakfast, we walked to the Mall by the Washington Monument for the March itself. It was a beautiful day, much warmer than last year. President Bush spoke to the marchers by phone and again expressed his support for the pro-life movement. Quite a few other dignitaries also spoke of the progress and future of the pro-life movement and opposition to abortion.

All in all, it was a great event. There is a very real chance of making significant progress in limiting abortion and furthering a 'Culture of Life', but we need to support pro-life candidates in the upcoming elections. A majority of the American population now supports limiting or abolishing abortion. President Bush may have the opportunity to nominate one or two pro-life Supreme Court justices, but needs a Senate that will allow his nominees to be brought to the floor for a vote. There is still a lot of work to be done, so keep praying and supporting pro-life issues and candidates.

Finally, mark your calendars for next year! January 22, 2005, falls on a **Saturday**, so you have the opportunity to make this important and wonderful trip with only one day off from work. We could have a large group of SPY students as well, because, unlike this year, final exams will be over for most students before the trip starts on Friday. So talk it up with your families, students, and fellow Knights and **join us next year!**

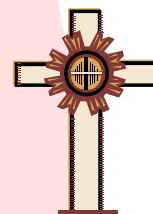

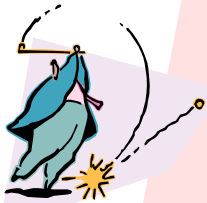

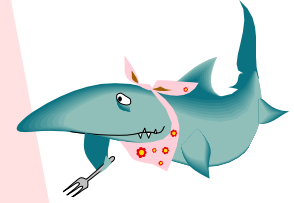

Insurance Corner

Beneficiaries... Who Do You Love?

It will soon be Valentine's Day. Do you know who the beneficiary is on your life insurance policy? It would be a wise idea to find out - and update your beneficiary if necessary. As your K of C agent, I can help you do that.

Why is this important? A life insurance policy protects the financial status of another person - or people - in the event of your death. Through a beneficiary designation, you determine just who that should be.

When you purchase a K of C insurance policy, you must select a primary beneficiary - at a minimum. You don't have to name a contingent beneficiary - also known as a "secondary beneficiary." However, it's always a wise move because you might outlive your primary beneficiary. A contingent beneficiary (also known as a "secondary" beneficiary) is the person designated to receive life insurance policy proceeds if the primary beneficiary dies.

You should be as specific as possible in wording your beneficiary designation. By naming your wife, daughter, son, etc., as beneficiary, you make sure that the life insurance proceeds will be available in a timely manner to them. Your life situation will undoubtedly change over time. Plan to update your declared beneficiaries periodically. Otherwise, the K of C will have no way of knowing what your intentions are at each stage of your life. Changing your beneficiary is fairly simple. You just need to fill out a change of beneficiary form (#113A) for each policy you want to change. I can provide you with these forms - and I will help you to fill them out. I can also help you with beneficiary designations for any life insurance policy you hold - regardless of the company that issued it.

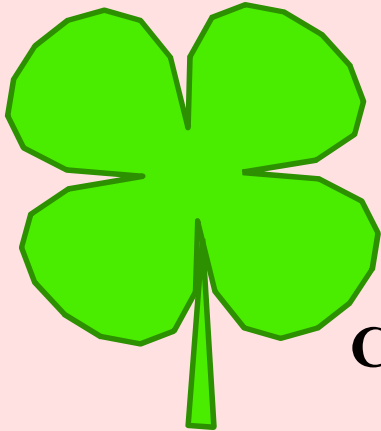
