Development Committee Magnet Sales: Bob Eisenacher reported that 2840 magnets were sold.

Pancake Breakfast: Help is needed for this Sunday's Pancake breakfast. Contact John Sambuco, but show up and help even if you don't call ahead.

Scholarship: A name has been chosen for this year's scholarship. It is usually named for a Knight who passed away, so this year it will be the Leon P. Quigley Scholarship. The fund contains \$1000. The deadline for entry is February 28, 2009. Scholarship announcements will be published in the Knights newsletter, the church bulletin, and on our website. It is open to any active Knight's child or grandchild who attends a Catholic grade school (grades 4 thru 8) or high school.

Unfinished Business:

Funds for Girl Scouts for "World Thinking Day" - Change of Venue: This event has grown too large to be held in Seton's PAC, so it has been moved to another location. As our Council agreed to pay the rent for the PAC, we need to reconsider this donation. Bob Eisenacher moved that we withdraw the donation. Ray Creamer seconded. Motion carried. The Grand Knight will notify John Letourneau.

New Business:

Charity List: Bob Eisenacher moved that we develop a list of charities that our Council can donate to. This will give the Council more control over requests and insure the charities are legitimate and meet our goals as Knights. Motion seconded by Wayne Patterson. After much discussion, the motion was amended to budget our charitable donations to equal the amount we make on the charity raffle tickets. After much more discussion, the motion was tabled to be considered at the next Saturday business meeting.

Matching Funds: Our Matching Funds donation is due soon. We budgeted \$500 for this. The Squires sent \$150, we feel we need to exceed that amount. Bog Glavan moved that we donate \$300. Fred Barwick seconded. Motion passed.

Vacancy for Chancellor: Due to other commitments and time constraints, Harry Clyburn can no longer fulfill his duties as Chancellor, which leaves this office vacant.

Coat Drive Funds: Mike Croyle reported for Dick and Joie Petersen that they collected 233 coats (including those purchased with cash donations), which is 23 more than last year. This exceeded their goal. They are short 72 pairs of gloves and hats, but have leftover cash donations of XXX. That amount added to the \$100 the Knights promised will purchase most of the needed gloves and hats, but they are still short XXX. Respect Life: Call to Action

The recent election was a disappointment for all those who respect life and oppose abortion. Our nation has elected the most radically pro-abortion president in history and a Congress that will fully support his radical agenda.

Apparently 1.2 million babies killed every year and almost 50 million killed since abortion was legalized isn't enough as Obama promised that one of his first acts as president will be to sign into law the misnamed Freedom of Choice Act (FOCA). This extremely dangerous bill was proposed by radically pro-abortion groups and their allies in Congress and is currently working its way through both the House and the Senate.

In a statement to President-elect Obama, the US Conference of Bishops (USCCB) stated in part:

"[FOCA] would, If brought forward in the same form today, outlaw any "interference" in providing abortion at will and would deprive the American people in all fifty states of the freedom they now have to enact modest restraints and regulations on the abortion industry.

FOCA would:

Coerce all Americans into subsidizing and promoting abortion with their tax dollars

Counteract any and all sincere efforts by government and other of good will to reduce the number of abortions in our country

Outlaw parental notification and informed consent precautions

Revoke laws banning procedures such as partial-birth abortion and protecting infants born alive after a failed abortion

Deregulate abortion clinics and subject women to abortions by non-physicians

Abrogate the Hyde Amendment restricting the Federal funding of abortions

Have an equally destructive effect on the freedom of conscience of doctors, nurses and health care workers whose personal convictions do not permit them to cooperate in the killing of unborn chil-

Threaten Catholic health care and Catholic Charities.

FOCA would have lethal consequences for prenatal human life. It would be an evil law that would further divide our country. On this issue, the legal protection of the unborn, the bishops are of one mind with Catholics and others of good will. Abortion is a medical procedure that kills, and the psychological and spiritual consequences are written in the sorrow and depression of many women and men. The bishops are single-minded because they are, first of all, single-hearted.”

While nothing about FOCA is good, certain effects stand out as being particularly disturbing. For example, your daughter or granddaughter needs parental permission to get an aspirin from the school nurse, but under FOCA she could get an abortion without ever notifying or talking to a responsible adult. Those of us who oppose abortion would be forced to pay for abortions through use of our tax dollars to fund them. Catholic hospitals and doctors would be forced to perform abortions or lose their right to remain open.

CALL TO ACTION: All pro-Life Knights and their families are urged to join USCCB, Human Life International, Priests for Life, and many others in fighting this assault on human life.

It is of the utmost importance that each and every one of you tells Congress to oppose this insidious act. Call the U.S. Capitol switchboard at 202-224-3121 to contact your Representative and two Senators as soon as possible!

No philosophical studies and no great effect of modernization of techniques will be of any avail unless our hearts are opened to receive light and grace from Him. The truth of the Beatitudes proclaimed on the Mount is felt with particular poignancy at Christmas, demanding the attention of all.

The Child born at Bethlehem is humble and lowly of heart, poor and innocent; He has come to bring peace, and in this cause He is already preparing for the supreme sacrifice.

This is the way for every man who accepts the divine message with willing balance, at whatever cost of effort and personal sacrifice.

In fact, because of the natural law human brotherhood; and because of the Christian doctrine of the Mystical Body, human dignity, freedom and justice depend on us all, individually and collectively.

Bethlehem teaches us to apply its lessons to the problems of our social life: to the defeat of selfishness, the intelligent awareness of the needs of others, and to the wider observation of the law of forgiveness, the *law of forgiveness*, the triumph of perfect brotherhood.

Father David Schalk: The Boy, The Man, The Priest ... Part 2

Dave is, and always has been, energetic, enthusiastic, dedicated to the task at hand, and has a delightfully humorous personality. He is an extrovert who is fun-loving and adventurous. In contrast, he has a deep spiritual side, and has always been interested in the needs of other people. Whatever Dave does, he gives it his all.

Playing percussion in marching band in high school opened many doors for potential friendships for Dave. He said, "Those four years of marching band were awesome. I learned a lot about working as a team and being a leader." He had the opportunity to march in the Fiesta Bowl and Tournament of Roses Parade with the Pickerington Marching Tigers. He selflessly remained behind at the hotel, with an injured band member, during the Fiesta Bowl. He has great compassion and a huge capacity for comforting others in pain.

The Kueblers took a trip with Dave to see Drum Corps Finals in the Orange Bowl stadium near Disney World. A soda shop by the name of "Peaches and Cream" where they stopped to have lunch, had a challenge going. To win the reward of having your name and photo put up on the wall in the shop, you had to buy and eat an enormous sundae, named "The Kitchen Sink." It consisted of a scoop of all the ice cream products and toppings available for purchase there. Upon Dave's insistence, they spent the money and ate the whole thing. This is just one example that proves Dave was never put off by a task that seemed impossible.

Fr. Michael Hickin was the coordinator for the Pastoral Works program during Dave's years in college seminary. During his interview, he said, "Dave was one of the few men who were absolutely passionate about serving people. Faithful as he was to academics, he loves being with people."

Dave has a passion for bringing Christ alive to young people. Surely, God will use his talents, especially theater and music, to reach the youth of today. Fr. Dave said, "I was fortunate to have a fantastic youth ministry program in high school. I want to give that same gift to other teens." Dave's personality is genuinely friendly, and what you see is what you get. Young people recognize his sincerity in his faith as well as his humanity and are drawn to him. Youth of today also enjoy his little quirks. Such as, Dave's drum set sits in the middle of his current living room. He enjoys putting on skits as a tool for teaching spiritual lessons to youth. Dave likes board games and whenever he plays the game of "Life" with the Kuebler family, he always takes the option to get married. He says it's the only time in his life it's ever going to happen. Dave refers to any negative situation as "bad chili." He says good-bye to his Seminarian friends by saying, "Peace in the Middle East." The Lord sends many rays of sunshine to His people, through Fr. Dave.

I believe he will be accepted and loved by the young people in any parish blessed to have him serve.

Dr. Carolyn Scott was the professor of freshman English at the Josephinum at the time Dave entered school. She found him to be effervescent, fun, very intelligent and deeply spiritual. He was always reverent and focused whenever he was in chapel. Dr. Scott had only ten to twelve students in each class, and that made it easier to get to know each one on a more personal level. She said

she always felt Dave would complete his studies and reach his goal to become a priest. She said he seemed very pastoral and truly caring about other people.

Dave was excellent in Philosophy and English. He accomplished writing one closing paper that satisfied both final class assignments. His topic was, 'Creative Fidelity', which happens to sum up who Dave is. His whole life has been about being faithful to God. Dr. Scott said, "Dave has a way of personalizing the abstract and has great empathy for people." Bob Moraine shared this observation. "Dave has an informed conscience that helps him stay steadfast in the culture we live in. He willingly sacrifices his own comfort for the good of others, and he has a heart for service and justice."

Involvement with music and theater were always a part of his experience at the Josephinum. Dr. Scott, whom Dave simply calls, "Doc," was also involved in the directing of plays. Dave made practices pleasant, and always wore a smile. He was always a good sport, no matter what he was asked to do on stage, or what costume he was asked to wear. He was very spontaneously funny and so comfortable in front of an audience. For three years he was asked to be the MC for the parent talent show. He knew how to get it all organized and still keep the human aspect. The third year he gave himself an award for being the "Best Host" of the talent show. It wasn't arrogance, he just has wonderful self-confidence. He loves to make people laugh. It is one way he has always passed over any clique barriers to become everyone's friend. Sharing his talents at his parish will always be a joy for him. His enthusiasm is contagious and everyone smiles when Dave enters a room. He naturally gives everyone's heart a lift.

Dr. Scott is a night-owl and her students knew they could call her with a problem into the wee hours of the morning. Once Dave began attending Mundelein Seminary in Chicago, he would sometimes call her late, to talk. This helped keep him awake during the long drive between cities. She was always glad to hear how he was doing, and was happy to help him keep alert as he drove.

One time, Dr. Scott met the Kuebler family through Dave's invitation. She had supper at the Kuebler home and they all attended a musical, put on by Pickerington High School students. She remembers they had back stage privileges because Dave seemed to know everyone there. Dr. Scott told me, "Dave is the link that often brings good people together. He has great passion for staying in touch with the people in his life, and family is very important to him."

As much as Dr. Scott was Dave's mentor, Fr. Mike became his good friend. Fr. Mike grew to know Dave to be a man of passion for the truth. He is honest and looks into the depths of the people he meets and the things he learns. Dave's upbeat personality causes Fr. Mike to think of him as, "Bouyant. He brings the mystery of the Ascension wherever he goes." Fr. Mike also said, "Dave knows that the Truth is a person, Jesus Christ."

Dave, as a deacon, visited Fr. Mike to see him in a parish setting. He had only known him as a faculty member. Fr. Dave told me, "Fr. Mike Hickin is a great priest. A man who is able to show the human side of the priesthood. I wanted to see him on the front lines of ministry."
