Saluting our Veterans

November 11, 2008 is Veterans day. What is Veterans day?

Veterans Day is an American holiday honoring military veterans. Both a federal holiday and a state holiday in all states, it's always celebrated on November 11th each year. It is also celebrated as Armistice Day or Remembrance Day in other parts of the world, falling on November 11, the anniversary of the signing of the Armistice that ended World War I. (Major hostilities of World War I were formally ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918 with the German signing of the Armistice.)"

In 1954 the Holiday was changed from Armistice Day to Veterans Day to honor American veterans of all wars.

The difference between Veterans Day and Memorial Day

Memorial Day honors service members who died in service to their country or as a result of injuries incurred during battle. Deceased veterans are also remembered on Veterans Day but the day is set aside to thank and honor living veterans who served honorably in the military - in wartime or peacetime.

Also did you know that the holiday is commonly printed as *Veteran's Day* or *Veterans' Day* in calendars and advertisements. While these spellings are grammatically acceptable, the United States government has declared that the attributive (no apostrophe) rather than the possessive case is the official spelling.

We are privileged to have veterans as members of our council. The next time you see one of them, thank them for their service. Without them and the sacrifices they made, we would not live in the greatest country in the world.



Why do we have Thanksgiving?

Thanksgiving Day, November 27, 2008 is an annual one-day holiday to give thanks, traditionally to God, for the things one has at the end of the harvest season.

In the United States, Thanksgiving is celebrated on the fourth Thursday of November.

This is going to be a three part series about our very own Fr. David Schalk. It was written by Maureen Patterson and you should find this very entertaining and informative ... enjoy!

Father David Schalk: The Boy, The Man, The Priest ... Part 1

The organ music began and the crucifix came down the aisle of the church. Following were the altar servers and the newly ordained priest, Father David Schalk. He chose to celebrate his first Mass with Seton Parish. He is a son of our parish. Fr. Dave is one of our own parishioners, who as a young man, grew to maturity amongst our parish influences. He learned about the love of God through his parents, his family, our lay-ministers, our priests, and our whole parish family. We praise God for this new priest.

Yet, most of us ask, who is this person, Fr. David Schalk? How did he hear God calling him to this vocation of priesthood in the Catholic Church? Just as the rest of us, he was first a child, then a teenager, then an adult. What bridge brought him to seek the path of a seminarian? What influences in his life brought him to be ordained a priest of the Diocese of Columbus? There is a hunger to learn about the personality and experiences of a priest, before he was a priest. Through interviews with persons of significance in Fr. Dave's life, and Fr. Dave himself, I intend to share who he is as a human being. Read on and together, we will get to know the person, Father David Schalk.

David Anthony Schalk is the baby of his family. His mother, Bernie, and father, Larry, both joke that he is their 'favorite' child. Several years younger than his next oldest sibling, Dave had the benefit of his parents past child-rearing experience, undivided attention, and the luxury of an established home with financial security, as he grew up. As we all know, parents are the first teachers of their children. In my estimation, that makes Larry and Bernie very special people.

The Schalk family and the Kuebler family have been close friends since 1972. The Kuebler's youngest child, Tim, and Dave were born just one day apart in December, 1981. Tim's mom, Margie Kuebler and Bernie Schalk took both boys to Disney World before they turned five years old. Tim rode every ride and David refused to get on anything. He was afraid of new experiences and the unknown. Fortunately, for all of us, he overcame that fear. Today, Cedar Point is one of Fr. Dave's favorite vacation destinations. He told me, "The higher, steeper and faster the ride, the better!" Perhaps, the Lord used this as a prerequisite for Dave eventually becoming a priest.

In junior high, Dave and Tim were best friends. Always ornery, they were caught toilet papering some houses and their fathers made them go back and clean it up. They were typical junior high kids. Dave ran some cross country and Tim played baseball. Dave loved to attend every game he could, to watch his friend play. The families spent lots of time together. Dave considered Mr. Jim Kuebler to be like a second father, and the family treated him as another son.

During this time period, Bob Moraine was hired by Father Steve Hawkins to be Seton's youth director. Dave was faithful in attending the youth classes and activities, even though it was more for social purposes at the time. Dave and his friends caused so many extreme distractions and hilarious disruptions, that eventually Bob had to remove them from class and have a

personal talk with them. The boys promised to stop causing such commotion during class time, and they kept their promise.

Dave made numerous trips to Cranks Creek, Kentucky with Bob Moraine and the youth from Seton during his junior high and high school years. Dave saw plenty of poverty, hunger and neglect there. He felt the families really needed his help. The heroes in Dave's life were people like Bobby and Becky Simpson. A blind gentleman and his wife, who dedicated their whole lives' to helping the poor in Cranks Creek. The Lord used these experiences to prepare Dave's heart to hear the Lord calling him to service.

Dave went on to serve on the S.P.Y. leadership team and asked Bob to be his confirmation sponsor in tenth grade. During Fr. Dave's interview he stated, "Spiritually speaking, Bob Moraine was probably the most influential person in my teen years. Under his guidance I grew in my relationship with Christ. It was in that relationship that I have heard the call."

Seton Parish began perpetual Eucharistic adoration in the year 2000. Dave committed to an hour each week of prayer before our Lord, Jesus Christ. It was here, in the quiet of the chapel, that Dave heard the Lord call him to the priesthood. Fr. Dave said, "I simply fell in love with Jesus, truly present in the consecrated host. I wanted the Eucharist to be at the center of my life." The plans Dave had made to attend Georgia Tech to study civil engineering was a well known fact in his family and the parish community. Yet, it was not the path that God had planned for Dave's purpose in this life.

By this time, Bob Moraine was no longer the youth director at Seton. Dave contacted him to talk about his possible vocation to the priesthood. Dave so was nervous about God's calling, he needed Bob's help to talk him through all the appropriate steps. Dave had to meet with the diocesan vocation director, and eventually tell his parents.

Dave made the outstanding announcement at his high school graduation party. He was answering God's call and would attend the Pontifical College Josephinum to study for the priesthood. Only a handful of people knew ahead of time. It was a shock and surprise to almost everyone. But, after some thought, it made perfect sense. Who better than this young man, who had grown in faith and wisdom and maturity? He loved people and was loved by all those fortunate enough to know him. He served the poor and hurting and was a fine example of leadership to the youth of the parish. Of course, he would make a wonderful priest! God hasn't stopped calling men to the priesthood. It's just that our lives are often too full of noise and distractions to hear Him. Dave slowed down and entered into quiet time with the Lord. It enabled him to follow the path for which he was created.

Larry and Bernie moved to Tennessee as Dave went off to the Josephinum. He was adopted by Jim and Margie Kuebler and were now his "surrogate Pickerington parents." Jim told me during his interview that the joke in the family was that Dave was like Kramer from Seinfeld in that, he would open their door and simply say, "I'm here." Then he would add, "It's good to see me, isn't it." It was a statement, not a question. Dave is very spontaneous by nature. Usually, when they received a phone call from Dave, they knew they would see him that same day. He would begin the conversation this way, "Hey, Mr. Kuebler, how ya doing? Have you eaten dinner yet? Do you happen to have an empty bed?"

Respect Life: Good News

For any Knight of our council who hasn't heard yet, we have **good news!** *Our council has agreed to sponsor a bus to take us to the March for Life in Washington, D.C., in January!* This is truly good news for anyone at Seton or the surrounding area who would like to join us on the trip.

This is a wonderful trip and everyone who has attended in the past tells us how impressed they are by everything about the trip, but especially by the enthusiasm of the many young people who attend the March. You cannot help coming away from the March fired up and hopeful about our future with these young people leading the way.

The trip will leave from the Seton parking lot early Wednesday morning, January 21, 2009, and will go directly to the Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C. with a stop for lunch along the way. We usually arrive at the Basilica around 4:00, even though the Mass for Life doesn't start until 7:00. We have to arrive that early to get seats because the Basilica only holds around 6,000 people - but 10,000 show up for this incredible Mass! We find the best seats we can and take turns saving the seats and touring the Basilica and visiting with friends. The Mass starts with an entrance procession that must be experienced to be believed! There are so many seminarians, deacons, priests, bishops, and cardinals in it that it takes 30 minutes for them to all file in! The Mass is usually said by the Cardinal who is the USCCB secretary for pro-life affairs.

After Mass, we go to our hotel – usually a 5-star downtown place like the Hilton or Marriott – and often will send out for pizza. The next morning, we will go to the Rock Mass for Life. This is held in a facility much like Nationwide Arena, but larger - 20,000 college and high school students and chaperones pack the place to the max. When was the last time you went to a Mass where the students actually **like** being there? 20,000 young people enjoying Mass, rocking along with the songs, and actually singing with gusto is something you will never forget!

When Mass is finished, all 20,000 of us will meet our police escort and march to the March for Life rally site on the Mall. We usually have a little extra time here, so some of us will break off and try to see some sights - maybe walk by the White House, or stop by the WWII or Vietnam Veterans Memorials, or go all the way to the Lincoln Memorial, or make a short visit to a museum. Of course, it is always good to stay at the Mall and listen to the moving talks by various Pro-Life speakers.

Those of us who did some sightseeing will make our way back to the Mall for the March itself. As we pick our way through the crowd, we always seem to run into people we know or meet interesting new people. When the March for Life itself begins, we proceed up Constitution Avenue to the Supreme Court building, praying, singing, cheering, and just enjoying ourselves. Looking forward, then looking back, you realize what an immense crowd over 300,000 people are! The first people in the March arrive at the Supreme Court about when the last are leaving the Mall! Then you look around and realize that 80 to 90% of the marchers are enthusiastic young people! How can you NOT be impressed? How can you still harbor doubts about our future?

After the March, we go to Union Station, grab a quick dinner at the food court, and get back on our bus for the trip home. It has been a long two days, so we watch videos, read, and visit until we

settle down enough to sleep for awhile.
