13 Aug 2008

**PRIOR TO OPENING MEETING:** Mr. Brian Ferguson of the Boy Scouts and Squires will make a request for funds to support his Pond side Shrine Project for Seton Parish.

**Reading of the Minutes:** A motion to waive the reading of the minutes as published, seconded and passed. No corrections

**Chaplain's Report:** No Report

**Report on Admissions:** No Report

**Grand Knight's Report:**

**Preschool Swing set:** We are nearing the end of the Swing set Project. Grand Knight thanked the following Knights for their help in this project: Mark Knight, Rob Allen, and especially Jerry Lowery. Jerry and his Brother Gary have devoted many hours to this project, and he also thanked everyone involved. Both Preschool Administrators Donna Swartz and Karen Pitt are very pleased with the work the Knights have provided. We have the last task of power washing and staining.

**Audit:** Thanks to the Worthy Financial Secretary, Treasurer, Deputy Grand Knight, and Trustees for taking the evening of July 29<sup>th</sup> to work on the Audit for the first half of the calendar year. It too about 2 ½ hours, but all the numbers balanced out, and the report has been submitted.

**Football Frenzy:** The Football Frenzy ticket sales are now starting, and this can be an easy money maker for our council. With the sale of every \$10.00 ticket, we immediately start off with a guaranteed \$2.50 rebate per ticket sold by this council. *NOTE: This is a reprint of the article contained in the August 2007 newsletter. We are getting ready to start our fundraising activities and the Grand Knight wanted to remind everyone that there is procedure in place to request funds.*

**Financial Procedures - requesting funds**

This article will attempt to clarify the financial procedures that have caused some past confusion and to explain some changes that will enable the Council to fully comply with directives from other authorities and to improve the Council’s financial accountabilities.

**Budgets versus Authority to Spend**

These items are separate processes. One has NO impact on the other. Budgets are used to guide the Council’s financial operations during the current year, while “authority to spend” is an approval process whether an item is included or not included in the budget. Including an item in the budget is NOT approval to spend unless it has been presented to the membership.

If you are one who routinely spends money on a particular item or event, i.e., chairperson, you may be asked to provide input into the planning for the budget; nevertheless, you must request membership approval to actually spend the money.

There are limited exceptions to this requirement. One is the Grand Knight’s discretionary ability to approve up to \$500 for a Knight in need. When he exercises this discretion, the Grand Knight will notify the membership at the next membership meeting. Other exceptions are payments to Supreme and State Chapters for “per capita” and related membership expenses, for example.

All other expenditures will require membership approval before encumbering the funds. If it is a recurring expenditure, e.g., first Saturday, postage, meeting refreshments these expenses should be approved an annual basis and presented to the membership before hand. The budget process provides and excellent vehicle to track expenditures against the approved amount and will quickly hi-lite when an approved amount is exceeded and additional approval is required.

Non-anticipated expenses must be approved as the need arises.

No expenditures will be reimbursed without membership approval.

It is worth noting that exact amounts are not necessary for approval. A “not to exceed” amount is acceptable.

All requests for reimbursement of previously approved expenditures must be presented with a “Request for Reimbursement” form, which can be found on the web page, along with appropriate receipts. The form must be signed by the Knight making the expenditure and, for those events having multiple chairpersons; the form must be signed by all chairpersons. Requests should be presented in a timely manner and not left to accumulate. We will do our best to make reimbursement within 2 weeks of receiving the request.

**Receipts and Deposits**

All receipts and deposits must be processed through the Financial Secretary. No exceptions! The Financial Secretary will take possession of all receipts and deposits and will make himself available accordingly or will provide prior delegation.

## "A Thousand Marbles"

The older I get, the more I enjoy Saturday mornings. Perhaps it's the quiet solitude that comes with being the first to rise, or maybe it's the unbounded joy of not having to be at work. Either way, the first few hours of a Saturday morning are most enjoyable. A few weeks ago, I was shuffling toward the basement shack with a steaming cup of coffee in one hand and the morning paper in the other. What began as a typical Saturday morning, turned into one of those lessons that life seems to hand you from time to time.

Let me tell you about it.

I turned the dial up into the phone portion of the band on my ham radio in order to listen to a Saturday morning swap net. Along the way, I came across an older sounding chap, with a tremendous signal and a golden voice. You know the kind, he sounded like he should be in the broadcasting business. He was telling whoever he was talking with something about "a thousand marbles".

I was intrigued and stopped to listen to what he had to say. "Well, Tom, it sure sounds like you're busy with your job. I'm sure they pay you well but it's a shame you have to be away from home and your family so much. Hard to believe a young fellow should have to work sixty or seventy hours a week to make ends meet. Too bad you missed your daughter's dance recital."

He continued, "let me tell you something Tom, something that has helped me keep a good perspective on my own priorities."

And that's when he began to explain his theory of a "thousand marbles."

You could have heard a pin drop on the band when this fellow signed off. I guess he gave us all a lot to think about.

I had planned to work on the antenna that morning, and then I was going to meet up with a few hams to work on the next club newsletter.

Instead, I went upstairs and woke my wife up with a kiss. "C'mon honey, I'm taking you and the kids to breakfast."

"What brought this on?" she asked with a smile.

"Oh, nothing special, it's just been a long time since we spent a Saturday together with the kids. Hey, can we stop at a toy store while we're out? I need to buy some marbles."

## Faithful Citizenship:

We are right in the middle of the Democratic and Republican Conventions. I believe that it is time that we take a look at what our church leaders have to say about our rights and responsibilities as faithful citizens.

I quote from the U.S. Bishops document on Faithful Citizenship,

"Pope Benedict XVI stated in Deus Caritas Est (God is Love), the Church wishes to help form consciences in political life and to stimulate greater insight into the authentic requirements of justice as well as greater readiness to act accordingly, even when this might involve conflict with situations of personal interest. The Church cannot and must not take upon herself the political battle to bring about the most just society possible. She cannot and must not replace the State. Yet at the same time she cannot and must not remain on the sidelines in the fight for justice."

As the Holy Father also taught in Deus Caritas Est, "The direct duty to work for a just ordering of society is proper to the lay faithful."

This duty is more critical than ever in today's political environment, where Catholics may feel politically disenfranchised, sensing that no party and too few candidates fully share the Church's comprehensive commitment to the life and dignity of every human being from conception to natural death. Yet this is not a time for retreat or discouragement; rather, it is a time for renewed engagement. Forming their consciences in accord with Catholic teaching, Catholic lay women and men can become actively involved: running for office; working within political parties; communicating their concerns and positions to elected officials; and joining diocesan social mission or advocacy networks, state Catholic conference initiatives, community organizations, and other efforts to apply authentic moral teaching in the public square.

Even those who cannot vote have the right to have their voices heard on issues that affect their lives and the common good. The document on Faithful Citizenship can be found at the following link:

## Unfair Pro-Life Activities

A couple of years ago, Time magazine featured a cover story about the declining numbers of abortions in recent years. While they tried to be even handed, the authors let their pro-abortion stance color the article, in particular when they said that pregnancy help centers were “unfair” to pro-abortion advocates. I never did figure out how these centers are “unfair”, unless offering a pregnant woman an alternative to abortion is unfair. They apparently think the only good pregnancy is one that is terminated by abortion.

The article continued with information on the incredible growth in numbers and clients of pregnancy help centers across the nation. It explained that women helped by these centers almost always decide against abortion, especially after seeing their child with ultrasound. I guess that is “unfair” to those who prefer to kill a baby.

Here in Central Ohio we are fortunate to have Pregnancy Decision Health Centers (PDHC) available at five locations in Franklin and Fairfield counties. Last year they served over 16,000 clients, offering programs in the areas of crisis intervention, support and healing, and prevention. All services are free and confidential. More than 200 volunteers assist paid staffers to offer these services to their clients.

Pregnant women who are considering abortion are given free medical exams, including ultrasounds, and if they decide to continue the pregnancy (as they almost always do) they are offered help throughout the pregnancy and birth process. In addition to free medical care, they are given layettes for their new baby.

Needless to say, this costs a lot of money. All of PDHC funds come from private donations. Our Council has generously supported them in the past, and I hope we will continue to do so in the future - this is a great organization that is measurably reducing the number of abortions in Central Ohio. In fact, they have a billboard directly over one of the busiest abortion clinics in Columbus!

**Now I want to ask you as individual Pro-Life Knights to stand up and show your true colors. PDHC’s biggest fund raiser is their annual dinner.** As we have for the past 3 years, the Seton Respect Life committee is sponsoring a table at the dinner. We can fill the 10 person table from our committee and the parish, but **we are challenging the Knights to fill at least one more table with 10 Knights from Council 11187.** We aren’t asking much - at least 10 Knights from a council of over 200, and you get a wonderful free dinner with inspiring talks. All it will cost you is one evening and whatever you feel called to donate to PDHC.

She has become a national figure in the Pro-Life movement and works with local and national legislators to protect both born and pre-born infants.
