All the Fish Fries are done, and Wayne thanked the squires for all of their hard work. Wayne also thanked all the Knights who dedicated all their time to make the Fish Fries successful. We were only short staffed on the second one, and the rest were fine.

We had to order new Measure Up aprons and handouts due to new wording requirements on each. The old wording could have been taken as offensive to mentally challenged individuals, so it was changed.

Report of Admissions: Jim Doty stated that we should have Kyle Ritter go through the first degree soon.

Treasurer Report: Frank Piper read the numbers for the month.

Council Officer Duties

Gentlemen, the time has come for our election of officer's for the next fraternal year. Many ask at this time, of the duties of the positions. These are listed here below for your consideration. Those not included here ... Financial Secretary, Lecturer, and Chaplain are due to the fact that they are appointed by either the Grand Knight or Supreme.

For any of you wishing to eventually attain the position of Grand Knight, a good practice (but, not a requirement) is to hold all offices. This aids you in directing your officers once in the top spot.

Grand Knight: The Grand Knight is responsible for the welfare of the council. He presides over council meetings, acts as an exofficio member of all committees, appoints a membership and programming director, convenes officers for a monthly meeting, and ensures all necessary reports are submitted to the state and Supreme Council. He should also be aware of the council's financial status and ensure that his signature appears on all checks drawn. The Grand Knight is a member of the Advisory Board with general supervision of the council's Columbian Squire circle.

Deputy Grand Knight: The Deputy Grand Knight is second in command. He assists the Grand Knight with council affairs and fulfills all duties assigned to him by the Grand Knight. Should the Grand Knight be absent from a council meeting, the Deputy Grand Knight presides. He is chairman of the council's retention committee and also a member of the Advisory Board charged with overseeing the council's sponsored Columbian Squires circle.

Chancellor: The Chancellor has a variety of responsibilities. Primarily, he assists the Grand Knight and the Deputy Grand Knight in the execution of their duties and oversees the council in both their absences. He is charged with strengthening the members' interests in council activities. The Chancellor is chairman of the admission committee and a member of the Columbian Squires circle ceremonial team.

Recorder: The Recorder is similar to a court reporter or a secretary. He is responsible for maintaining a true record of all actions of the council and its correspondence.

Treasurer: The Treasurer is responsible for the safekeeping and maintaining records of all council funds and accounts. He is responsible for depositing money into the council's accounts and provides a certificate of such monies to the Grand Knight. He is also responsible for payment of all expenses.

Advocate: The Advocate is the legal representative of the council and serves as the council's attorney at trials and investigations of any interest to the council. While he does not need to be a member of the legal profession, he should be familiar with the council by-laws, the Order's Charter, Constitution and Laws, Methods of Conducting a Council Meeting, and Robert's Rules of Order.

Warden: The Warden is the 'watchdog' for council property and degree paraphernalia, except the property of the financial secretary, treasurer and recorder. He is also responsible for setting up the council chambers for meetings and ceremonial work. During ceremonial exemplifications, he will appoint and supervise guards.

Inside/Outside Guards: The Guards have similar responsibilities, but distinct differences. The Outside Guard tends to the outer door admitting visitors and members to the inner door. Once at the inner door, the Inside Guard checks to make sure that their membership cards are current.

Board of Trustees: The Board of Trustees consists of three members elected by the council and the Grand Knight, who serves as chairman of the board. They oversee the work of the Financial Secretary and Treasurer, and with the Deputy Grand Knight serve on the council's retention committee. During council elections, only the Three-year Trustee is voted on, with the others moving on to become two and one-year trustees, respectively.

Be Proud of our Catholicism

With all of the negativity surrounding our priests in the media today, here is a pleasant change. This article was written by a Jewish business man. We Catholics could take some PR lessons from him! It was sent to us by Suzi Rodriguez, daughter of Joe Rossi, one of our former Grand Knights who is now deceased. Thanks Suzi. Your father would be proud.

"Why would newspapers carry on a vendetta on one of the most important institutions that we have today in the United States, namely the Catholic Church?

Do you know - the Catholic Church educates 2.6 million elementary and high school students everyday at the cost to that Church of 10 billion dollars, and a savings on the other hand to the American taxpayer of 18 billion dollars. The graduates go on to university studies at the rate of 92%.

The Church has 230 colleges and universities in the U.S. with an enrollment of 700,000 students.

The Catholic Church has a non-profit hospital system of 637 hospitals, which account for hospital treatment of 1 out of every 5 people - not just Catholics - in the United States today

But the press is vindictive and trying to totally denigrate in every way the Catholic Church in this country. They have blamed the disease of pedophilia on the Catholic Church, which is as irresponsible as blaming adultery on the institution of marriage.

Let me give you some figures that Catholics should know and remember. For example, 12% of the 300 Protestant clergy surveyed admitted to sexual intercourse with a parishioner; 38% acknowledged other inappropriate sexual contact in a study by

the United Methodist Church, 41.8% of clergy women reported unwanted sexual behavior; 17% of laywomen have been sexually harassed.

Meanwhile, 1.7% of the Catholic clergy has been found guilty of pedophilia. 10% of the Protestant ministers have been found guilty of pedophilia. This is not just a Catholic problem.

A study of American priests showed that most are happy in the priesthood and find it even better than they had expected, and that most, if given the choice, would choose to be priests again in face of all this obnoxious PR the church has been receiving.

The Catholic Church is bleeding from self-inflicted wounds. The agony that Catholics have felt and suffered is not necessarily the fault of the Church. You have been hurt by a small number of wayward priests that have probably been weeded out by now.

Walk with your shoulders high and your head higher. Be a proud member of the most important non-governmental entity in the United States today. Then remember what Jeremiah said: 'Stand by the roads, and look and ask for the ancient paths, where the good way is and walk in it, and find rest for your souls'. Be proud to speak up for your faith with pride and reverence and learn what your Church does for all other religions."

This is the Third of the series about the prayer the 'Our Father'

'GIVE US THIS DAY OUR DAILY BREAD"

Respect Life: Immigrant Dilemma

Yesterday, while talking to my son who lives in Arizona, illegal immigration came up. The governor of Arizona just signed a bill passed by the Arizona legislature allowing Arizona police and sheriffs to stop people and check ID's of people they suspect may be illegal immigrants. Before this law, they could only make this check if they stopped them for some other reason or probable cause. President Obama immediately asked the Justice Department to find a way to rescind the new law on the grounds that it could lead to racial profiling. The US Constitution states that this is a federal obligation, but Arizona says the US Government has not been doing its job so Arizona must.

My son told me there are 450,000 illegal immigrants in Arizona alone, and they are third (after California and Texas) in illegal immigration. Arizona is having a budget crisis like many states and the burden of illegal immigration is a major part of that. This hits close to home for my son as his wife teaches in a school that has many legal and illegal immigrants. The Arizona school system has to make many cutbacks due to the budget crisis and many people think illegal immigrants are overburdening the school system.

On the other hand, undocumented workers do many jobs that American workers will not do at the wages businesses are willing to pay. This conversation and the publicity about the new law reminded me of some information I got a few months ago about immigration. It is from an organization called "Justice for Immigrants", founded by USCCB and a number of other Catholic organizations.

The documents I have address some of these questions and give the Bishop's and Catholic Church's responses:

Catholic Social Teaching states that people have a right to find opportunities in their homeland, but if they cannot, they have the right to migrate to support themselves and their families. The Church also recognizes the right of sovereign nations to control their borders; however, they should afford protection to refugees and asylum seekers who fear death, harm or persecution in their home nations. Nations should respect the human rights and dignity of undocumented migrants and not abuse them or detain them in deplorable conditions while affording them due process of the law.

But they broke the law so they should not be rewarded by allowing them to stay. While the Church supports the rule of law, there are times when laws should be examined and changed. In many ways the current immigration system is broken and contributes to the abuse and exploitation of migrants. Current immigration laws are old, outdated and arbitrarily limit immigration to unrealistic numbers.

Providing legal status to undocumented immigrants penalizes immigrants who follow the rules. The US Bishops address this very real concern with a proposal that requires undocumented workers work six years before applying for permanent resident status. This moves them to "the end of the line" behind immigrants who have petitioned for a green card under current rules.

The US Bishops believe that revising immigration laws and removing many of the obstacles to immigration will solve most of our immigration problems while respecting a nation's right and obligation to secure its borders.


