Business Meeting Minutes - April 11, 2012

The meeting was called to order promptly at 7:30PM by Grand Knight Tim Bowie

All officers ... with the exception of our Chaplain and our Deputy Grand Knight ... were in attendance.

The minutes of the last meeting were motioned for approval by Edd Chinnock, seconded by Mike Sillings, voted on and passed.

Chaplain's Report: No report

Admissions Committee: As of this reading, a First Degree was conducted and two new members joined our ranks! Please welcome Ryan Anderson and Mike Zeller as new knights!

Grand Knight's Report: G.K. Tim Bowie then began with a laundry list of important and interesting items.

Tim mentioned the success of the St. Patrick's Day Party and although the attendance was not record breaking it was a tremendous event.

Thom Laughery then gave a numbers report on the success of the Fish Fry events. We set a record with over 1920 meals served! The profit was great and was attributed to the new advertising, the take out window and of course, the hard work by our dedicated members. Great job Thom, and to our other leaders in Frank Hare and John Letourneau.

Tim reminded all that our Saturday meetings (held the first Saturday of the month) are not Officer's Meetings, but Planning Meetings and shall henceforth be referred to as such! Due to First Communion celebrations, the May Meeting will be on May 12th with a rosary at 8:30AM and the meeting at 9:00AM. Please attend, especially if you have an event to prepare for.

The Trainer family sent us thanks for our involvement in the Blood Marrow Drive for Joan Marie. Although she could not benefit from the event, many others hopefully will!

Tim next read a note from the Supreme Council asking us to consider providing assistance to the Special Olympics. It was brought up that we already give towards this group with funds from the Measure Up program. Tim said "oops" and then solicited help for the Measure Up campaign scheduled for May 4th and 5th.

Our Grand Knight then relinquished the floor to Russ Ridgeway who spoke on his involvement with Care Dogs and the cost of raising and training them for needy youth and adults.

Tim then reminded all that there was a 2nd and 3rd Degree scheduled for April 22nd at St. Andrews. Any 1st Degree members were asked to consider stepping up and advancing their degrees. Brother John McFaul chose to do so and as of this reading you can congratulate him on the completion of both degrees. Way to go, John.

Tim then mentioned a Catholic Social Services Mass at the Neumann Center on the OSU campus coming up. It would be a 9:00AM Saturday Service for those wishing to attend.

The State Convention is set for May 26th and 27th in Cincinnati. Our leaders will attend.

Treasurer Report: Brother Mike Phillips reported on our funds on hand and our decent status financially. He also took a minute to explain that although our coffers look full, the funds therein are not all available for quick access. We really only have access to

Respect Life: Eighty Minutes for Life

This article was written by fellow Knight Jim Anderson after he participated in the 40 Days for Life campaign. Jim is a member of Council 11187 and Assembly 2900. He says it far better than I ever could!

“Eighty Minutes for Life” by Jim Anderson

I’ve been pro-life for over thirty years, but I had never demonstrated in front of an abortion clinic until March 14th, 2012.

The calendar still said “winter”, but it felt like early summer in Columbus as I walked the block and half from the Byzantine Catholic Church parking lot to the North Cleveland Avenue site of the “40 Days for Life” sidewalk witness. There were three other people there as I arrived at 11:50 a.m. I nodded and said hello to all and chatted for a few minutes with the lady from my parish who had taken the hour slot leading up to noon. She told me that, like me, she had never done anything like this before, but was very glad a friend in the parish had recruited her to step up and witness for Life. She was very encouraging as she handed me her sign a few minutes after noon. We said our goodbyes and soon enough I was the only person on the sidewalk.

Traffic was sporadic on the street but I made sure all passing cars could read the message on my sign: “Pray to End Abortion Here” As I’d been told, there were some responses. Over the next hour nine cars honked their horns in support, waving, smiling and giving thumbs up. Three other cars honked their horns and expressed their opposition with the “one fingered salute”. One man managed to honk his horn, flip me off and yell “faggot!”, which made me laugh out loud. I wondered what his story was.

When there was an occasional lull in the traffic I looked, really looked, at the clinic, which goes by the bland and misleading name “Complete Healthcare for Women.” How nondescript it was! How strange and tragic to think about the hundreds of helpless innocents whose lives are violently snuffed out there each year. I thought of the apt phrase from the Nuremburg trials of the Nazis: “the mundanity of evil”, used to describe seemingly regular people involved in and committing horrific and deadly acts. I prayed that the hearts of the doctors and nurses there would be changed by God to affirm life. I then began praying my rosary as I walked north and south making sure the cars could see the sign as they drove past. It was a small thing, but it was, at least, a witness.

At 12:20 a young man, perhaps 24, who looked like he could’ve played linebacker in high school came up to me. He got very close and looked me right in the eye and said: “I’m with you brother. I’m adopted and I’m GLAD my mother gave me life!” He introduced himself as Joshua and we talked for a bit. I offered the idea to him that one of his main missions in life was to share that thought with many others. He seemed to like that. When he strolled back by 30 minutes later he told me that he had never thought of praying to end abortion, but that he would begin to do just that. Joshua, may you pray in the spirit of sacred Life, the Holy Spirit, in which your mother honored you by giving you birth!

Around 12:40 a lady in a white minivan pulled up to the stop sign at the side street. Fortunately I was very close to the corner. Through the open window she looked at me and said: “God bless you for what you’re doing. I had one of those years ago and I’ve

never really gotten over it. They never tell you that! I’ve had other kids since then, but I’ve had a void since then that hasn’t been filled. **THEY NEVER TELL YOU THAT!**” Her last statement was said with real emotional intensity. I told her that God had forgiven her, but realized that I was not well prepared to offer much wisdom or guidance. We spoke for a few more minutes. It was only after she drove away that I wished I had mentioned Bethesda Healing Ministry and had encouraged her to contact them.

At 1:10 I went two doors north and dropped off my sign at the PDHC office. It was a very good feeling to step inside and know that God’s truth and love was being lived out there. A young woman was filling out paperwork - I wished she could speak with Joshua and the lady in the minivan. I hope she chooses life, no matter the challenges.

As it had turned out, the friends from my parish scheduled to cover the 1:00 time slot had a family emergency and were unable to show up. During that hour, like most other hours, hundreds of people would pass by that mundane looking building likely never knowing or guessing that it was a place of such darkness.

So that was it: my “80 minutes for Life.” I will probably never find out if it had any impact, though I’m glad I had the two encounters I had. I’d like to think they had value. Thinking about the young man, Joshua, I guessed that he had been born in 1988. Perhaps that was the same year that the lady in the minivan made her fateful and now deeply regretted choice.

Sadly, we know that our dominant culture and media have no interest in these two poignant and compelling stories. That makes our witness to Life all the more important. What if we’d had 10, 20 or 30 people on that sidewalk each hour of each day? What a difference that witness might make!

“Forty Days for Life” will come around again. Sign up. Speak out and speak up for Life. Do what you can, in other ways, prayerfully, practically and financially to be pro-Life. As Blessed John Paul II urged us, using the words of Christ and many other messengers of truth: “Do not be afraid”

Council Officer Duties

Gentlemen, the time has come for our election of officer's for the next fraternal year. Many ask at this time, of the duties of the positions. These are listed here below for your consideration. Those not included here ... Financial Secretary, Lecturer, and Chaplain are due to the fact that they are appointed by either the Grand Knight or Supreme.

For any of you wishing to eventually attain the position of Grand Knight, a good practice (but, not a requirement) is to hold all offices. This aids you in directing your officers once in the top spot.

Grand Knight: The Grand Knight is responsible for the welfare of the council. He presides over council meetings, acts as an ex-officio member of all committees, appoints a membership and programming director, convenes officers for a monthly meeting, and ensures all necessary reports are submitted to the state and Supreme Council. He should also be aware of the council's financial status and ensure that his signature appears on all checks drawn. The Grand Knight is a member of the Advisory Board with general supervision of the council's Columbian Squire circle.

Deputy Grand Knight: The Deputy Grand Knight is second in command. He assists the Grand Knight with council affairs and fulfills all duties assigned to him by the Grand Knight. Should the Grand Knight be absent from a council meeting, the Deputy Grand Knight presides. He is chairman of the council's retention committee and also a member of the Advisory Board charged with overseeing the council's sponsored Columbian Squires circle.

Chancellor: The Chancellor has a variety of responsibilities. Primarily, he assists the Grand Knight and the Deputy Grand Knight in the execution of their duties and oversees the council in both their absences. He is charged with strengthening the members' interests in council activities. The Chancellor is chairman of the admission committee and a member of the Columbian Squires circle ceremonial team.

Recorder: The Recorder is similar to a court reporter or a secretary. He is responsible for maintaining a true record of all actions of the council and its correspondence.

Treasurer: The Treasurer is responsible for the safekeeping and maintaining records of all council funds and accounts. He is responsible for depositing money into the council's accounts and provides a certificate of such monies to the Grand Knight. He is also responsible for payment of all expenses.

Advocate: The Advocate is the legal representative of the council and serves as the council's attorney at trials and investigations of any interest to the council. While he does not need to be a member of the legal profession, he should be familiar with the council by-laws, the Order's Charter, Constitution and Laws, Methods of Conducting a Council Meeting, and Robert's Rules of Order.

Warden: The Warden is the 'watchdog' for council property and degree paraphernalia, except the property of the financial secretary, treasurer and recorder. He is also responsible for setting up the council chambers for meetings and ceremonial work. During ceremonial exemplifications, he will appoint and supervise guards.

Inside/Outside Guards: The Guards have similar responsibilities, but distinct differences. The Outside Guard tends to the outer door admitting visitors and members to the inner door. Once at the inner door, the Inside Guard checks to make sure that their membership cards are current.

Board of Trustees: The Board of Trustees consists of three members elected by the council and the Grand Knight, who serves as chairman of the board. They oversee the work of the Financial Secretary and Treasurer, and with the Deputy Grand Knight serve on the council's retention committee. During council elections, only the Three-year Trustee is voted on, with the others moving on to become two and one-year trustees, respectively.

Hair of the Dog

An ancient Roman belief that `like cures like.'

Thus as a remedy for a dog bite the victim would attach to is skin a patch of hair from the dog that bit him. From this evolved the modern version of "hair of the dog" "curing" the morning after a hang over from a drinking binge by taking a stiff drink.

Without superstitious implication it can be said that divine providence has chosen to follow a kind of "like cures like" in remedying man's hangover from original sin - the sin of our proto-parents in the Garden of Eden. That disastrous failure called for a human remedy - a human person who could represent fallen humanity before God, but one who would also be Divine, in order to atone adequately to the divine majesty that was offended. Both requirements were fulfilled in our God-man Redeemer.

Because his incarnation was completed through his suffering, the "like cures like" principle is not limited to redeeming us, but is extended even to our physical healing; even our sufferings (Heb 2:10) can be "cured" by his. Peter (1Peter 2:24) reasserts this quoting Isaiah "By his wounds we are healed" (Is 53:5)

Admittedly, this approach to healing -----"dumping" on the Lord for our sufferings, knowing that he has already borne for us -requires a consummate and rare form of faith.

Let us ask for it.
